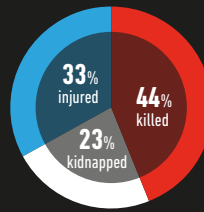

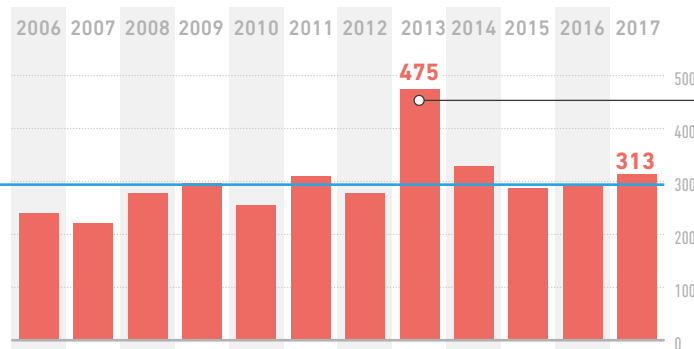

### VICTIMS BY YEAR

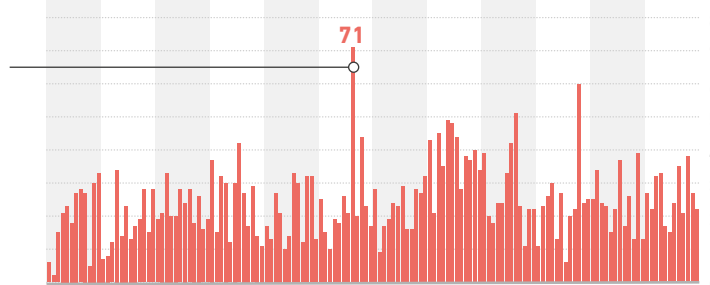
With the exception of 2013, there has been an average of 293 victims in the past 12 years.



2013 saw the highest number of victims due to worsening crises in South Sudan and Syria, and continued violence in Afghanistan, Pakistan and Sudan.

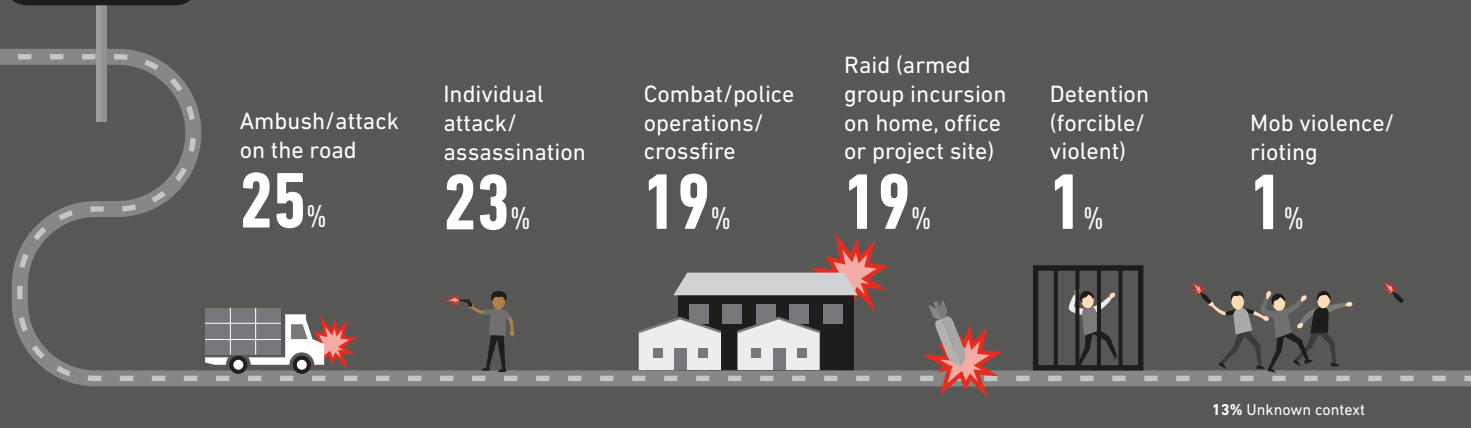
### VICTIMS BY MONTH

In August 2011, a suicide bomber attacked the United Nations building in Abuja, Nigeria, killing 9 people and injuring 37 people. This was the highest number of victims in a single month.

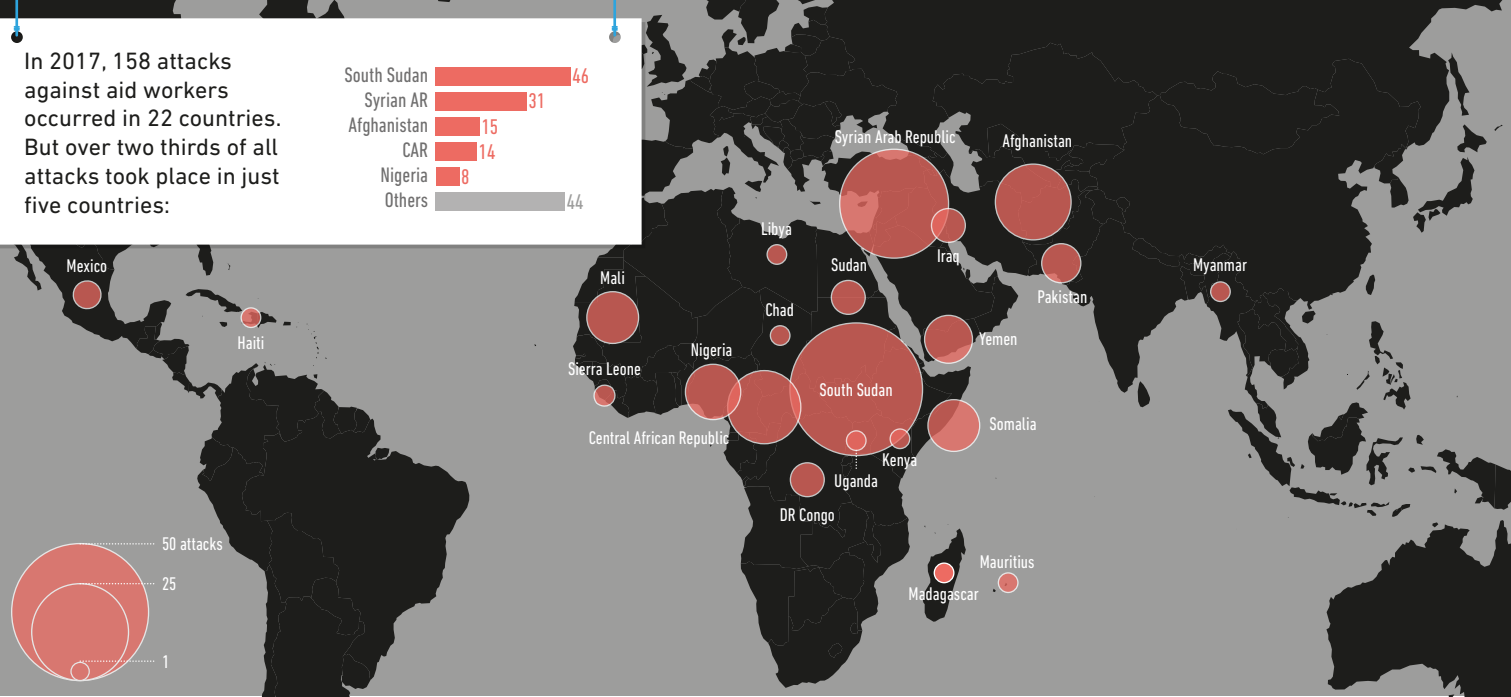
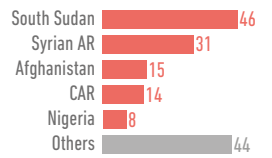




## CONTEXT OF ATTACKS

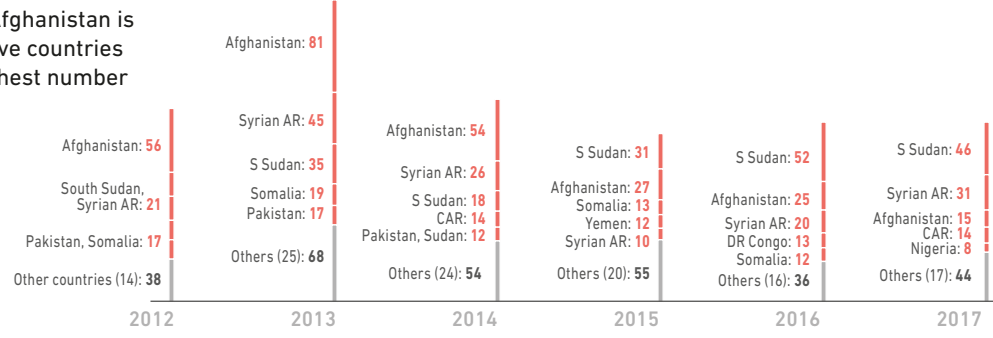


In 2017, 158 attacks against aid workers occurred in 22 countries. But over two thirds of all attacks took place in just five countries:



## TIMELINE OF FIVE COUNTRIES WITH THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF ATTACKS PER YEAR

Each year, Afghanistan is one of the five countries with the highest number of attacks.



2017 was Nigeria's first year as one of the five worst countries. South Sudan continues to be the country with the highest number of attacks.
